At the October 31, 1974, meeting of the Joint AGC-DOT Specifications Committee we agreed to include in each construction contract proposal a list of any recent or special laws or regulations that would be likely to affect the Contractor's operations.

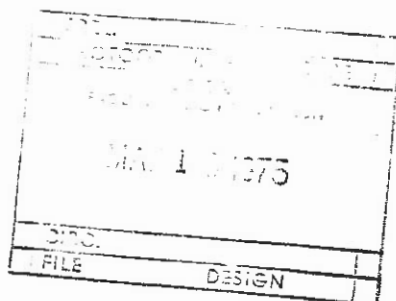
All PS&E submitted to the Deputy Chief Engineer, Facilities Design, after April 1, 1975, should contain a copy of the attached note with a list of regional or local laws and regulations and a brief description of the possible effect on contract operations. The Agency submitting the PS&E will be responsible for including this note whether it be the Regional Design Office, the Central Design Bureau, the Structures Subdivision or the Waterways Maintenance Subdivision. The Final Plan Review Bureau will add information concerning laws or regulations that affect all projects statewide.

The list should include any local regulation that could affect a Contractor's operations in the vicinity of the project, such as:

- Land use controls
- Noise ordinances
- Hauling or load limitations
- Air or water pollution controls
- Working hour restrictions

The attached note concerning land use in the Adirondack Park is offered as an example.

SPECIAL NOTE

LAWS, PERMITS, AND LICENSES

Section 107-01 of the Specifications requires the Contractor to observe all federal, state, and local laws and regulations. The following is a list of some of the laws and regulations which may affect the Contractor's operations on this project. This information is provided as a convenience to bidders and contractors. It is not intended to be all inclusive and does not relieve the Contractor of his responsibility to determine which federal, state, and local laws and regulations apply to his operations on this contract and to comply with them.

- Article 27 of the Executive Law of the State of New York regulates the use of all public and private lands within the Adirondack Park, including borrow pits and spoil areas. Applications for permits for such uses must be submitted to the Adirondack Park Agency.
